Eskom further committed to fix the center's roof and ceiling as the center unfortunately suffered damages to its roof during the December 2022 rain storms.

Residents packed the venue eager to be assisted with queries relating to their account status. Dipaleseng officials from the Budget & Treasury and Public Participation units, ward committee members were present to assist community members with the filling of forms. Balfour Police Station also sent members to assist with affidavits and document certification while councilors were responsible for approving applications on-site.

It was an information packed session with the objective of empowering community members to enjoy their due rights through

DLUDLU STREET COMPLETED!

At the backdrop of more than half of the country's unpaved road network being said to be in poor to very poor condition, while about a third of the paved network being in poor to very poor condition.

Dipaleseng Local Municipality implemented a eight hundred and two (802) meter long road paving project along Dluldu Street in Ward 1 in Siyathemba as part of its Capital Projects.

The project budget amount was R12 million with the contractor appointed R9,5 million through the Municipal Infrastructure Grant.







The construction project which commenced back in January 2022 was handed over to the municipality which the political leadership thus officially opened on the 15th August 2023.

Throughout implementation, the project was also able to create 30 job opportunities for locals.

Similar to any other project, this one faced its fair share of challenges, some resulting in numerous service delivery disruptions. The municipality remains appreciative to residents residing in the vicinity as well as the community at large for their patience and understanding during the construction process.

Municipal youth, sports, and culture desk is developed for all inhabitants of Dipaleseng particularly young people. The desk was established to remain mindful of socio-economic challenges affecting our inhabitants. The high rate of drug dependency, crime, violence, sexuality, unemployment and poverty comes as a result of marginalised people primarily manifested in racial segregation, rural based youth, high scarce skills, minimal economic active participation and job scarce environment which works against job seekers particularly young people.



The desk sought to develop a comprehensive context specific to lack of competitiveness in sports, arts and employment skills that poses a serious threat to the municipal long-term socio-economic growth should it not be efficiently addressed. The unit is embarking on a strategy to reposition youth, sports, arts and cultural programmes of action for social cohesion, creation of sustainable jobs and skills development and economic emancipation. The significance progress builds

on the strategic framework that sought to enhance maximum economic participation, development and social cohesion for our community.

It is against this backdrop that the The Executive Mayor, Cllr. Khethwe Moeketsi hosted the Mayoral cup games tournament on the 04th August 2023 at Siyathemba Stadium, which tournament consisted of four teams from the three nodal points of Dipaleseng, organised

Subsection 152(1) (c) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa demands that each local municipality promotes social and economic development. In line with this constitutional

obligation, the municipality has identified the development of a credible and pragmatic Local Economic Development Strategy which shall serve as a tool for conceptualising, development, implementation and execution of its economic development functions. As it stands, the existing Local Economic Development Strategy is under review and a final plan is planned for finalization in March 2024, in time with the approval of the Draft Reviewed 2024/25 Integrated Development Plan and Budget.

This is the drive behind the municipality having hosted a Local Economic Development Summit with a rider to also re-launching the Local Economic Development Forum for the local stakeholders under the theme "Economic Diversifica-

tion and Investment Attraction in Dipaleseng Municipality".



Planning & Economic Development

The summit, held on the 21st and 22nd September at the Siyathemba Thusong Service Centre, was aimed at creating a platform to encourage government, business formations and a wide range of stakeholders such as Non Government Organi-



zations and Non Profit Organizations to participate through vigorous discussions on the economic status quo and opportunities in Dipaleseng Local Municipality that will promote economic diversification, investment attraction and sustainable job creation whilst at the same time embracing the 4th Industrial Revolution, climate change and Just Energy Transition phenomena.

The primary objectives of the Summit were to forge, strengthen partnerships and collaborations between the public and private sector and civil society for inclusive economic growth, diversification and social development in the Municipality. The gaining of efficient and optimal management of LED processes to ensure the acceleration of inclusive and sustainable economic growth based on our superior visionary leadership.

The summit also ensured for a wide spectrum of ideas were shared, including innovative solutions proposed to facilitate the building of a vibrant economy and ensure inward investment was enticed within a short period of time.





The summit commenced with base-line information on some of the topics, but not limited to; Implemented Local Economic Development programmes from the last summit held, Identified sectors in line with the Mpumalanga Economic Growth and Development Plan and Dipaleseng SDF and IDP, Just Energy Transition / Green Economy, 4th Industrial Revolution, Township

Economy, Investment Attraction and its Retention as well as Tourism.

Sector-based Commissions with cross cutting issues were established and clustered into 3 components, namely; Commission 1: Construction, Manufacturing, Land Reforms/ Estate Development, Mining and Energy, Transport Logistics; Commission 2: Women and Youth in Business, Informal and Township



Economy and Unemployment organisations, and Commission 3: Agriculture, Tourism, Sports, Arts & Culture and Social Welfare.

These commissions were involved in very robust, honest and sometimes very confrontational deliberations on plans, programs and proposed ideas and proposals that would find expression in the aforementioned final LED Strategy that would assist to fulfil economic diversification while attracting sustainable investment for the locality.

The second day commenced with the wrapping up from the previous day's deliberations through the tabling of reports from the three commissions and discussions thereof. The Summit was also subjected to an introduction of a new building material to be manufactured within Dipaleseng. With the commission reporting being brought to a conclusion, the focus of the house then shifted to the election of chairpersons to lead the various working groups

and the re-launching of the Local Economic Development Forum. In terms of a mutual consensus, eleven working groups would constitute the newly relaunched LED Forum under the overall presiding chairperson, the Honourable Executive Mayor of the Municipality. The following working groups were agreed upon, (1) Youth, (2) Education, (3) Women in Business, (4) NGOs and

NPOs, (5) Mining and Energy, (6) Agriculture and Land Reforms, (7) Tourism, Arts and Culture, (8) Township and Rural Economy, (9) Construction, (10) Manufacturing and (11) Transport Logistics.

The Summit assisted the municipality to create a platform for best practice sharing

between practitioners, civil society, and other parties to strategize and plan a development trajectory towards the smart, sustainable, and inclusive economic growth, which led to a development of a joint action plan for the municipality's proactive attempt to circumvent the low growth, high unemployment and inequalities characterizing the municipal jurisdictional space.

All the proceedings were undertaken in the presence and under the watchful eye of the Provincial Department of Cooperative Governance & Traditional Affairs, as the custodian upper structure of local government affairs.








The municipality is delighted at hosting such a summit and further commits to escalate all the declarations made therein into the economic agenda of Council.

2023 marks the 67th anniversary of the 1956 women's march to the Union Buildings, thus the 9th of Aug<mark>ust serves</mark> as a reminder of the crucial role that women play not only in our country, but in society as whole.

South Africa has a plethora of strong laws and policies to advance women's rights and gender equality, however women continue to be disproportionately affected by poverty, unemployment, hunger and inequalities.

The focus for the 2023 Women's Month programme is on the acceleration of socio-economic programmes and activities across different sectors to fast track gender mainstreaming across initiatives such as; creating more opportunities for women's inclusion and empowerment; enabling women to either take up employment in apprehensive sectors or develop their entrepreneurship or businesses within these.

Drawing on the various on-going economic initiatives and interventions in the country is critical for the inclusion of women into mainstream economic activities. The emphasis is not just on women's employment, but on their participation, representation, ownership and control within the economic sphere. There are ongoing programmes by key government departments to also increase women's access to opportunities for entrepreneurship development, SMMEs and Cooperatives.

At a more local level, efforts can be aimed at identify existing challenges for women in penetrating various job sectors, identifying current opportunity areas in terms of employment, job creation, enterprise development and SMMEs as well as within existing value chains.

Through relevant structures, exercises that would explore funding opportunities available, create the space for sharing of experiences from women in all their diverse sectors and initiating processes of identifying role models for lobbying and advocacy especially to young women and school going girls for career pathing and leadership pipeline creation should be undertaken.
